

Why did it start?

Since late 202, you may have noticed that prices have been increasing, this is because shops have had to increase prices to get back the money that they lost in covid. It is expected to ease this year but wages compared to prices are only



predicted to be back to 2021 level in 2027.

What is the Cost of Living Crisis and who has it affected?

What is pupil parliament, you ask? Well it is when children are invited to meet and discuss what can happen in their school. In these sessions, pupils make important suggestions on rules and activities that the school can take part in.

This term, we discussed how important diversity is and what it means. The dictionary meaning of diversity is: "the practice or quality of including or involving people from a range of different social and ethnic backgrounds and of different genders, sexual orientations etc."

However, what it means to us personally, is that no matter who you are or what you look like you matter and all 'groups' of people should be included. A quote from Dr Christie on the meaning of diversity, "A wide range of differences all taking part together." Miss Luzzeri commented, "I think that pupil parliament is a great chance for all the year groups to discuss important opinions."

Following on from this we have a special extract from the mayor's recent speech at our school on the meaning of diversity. She commented, "No matter your background you matter to society. Look at your hand. It joins with different lengths, but take a finger away, then you will find it hard to use your hand."

At every Pupil Parliament, Year 5 collect Year 2 and Year 6 collect Year 1 to take them to their appropriate station for the meeting.



Where can you find help?

What is E-safety?

E Safety is about being safe online and being aware of the possible dangers that can occur online, and how to deal with them. Internet safety is an important topic for everyone. It is essential to know how to protect yourself from potential dangers. Here are some rules to keep you safe (SMART rules).

The **SMART** Rules!

S=Safety, Keep safe by not giving out personal information, such as your name, email address and home address to people online.

M=Meeting, Meeting someone you only know online can be very dangerous. You should only do this when a parent or carer gives you permission to do so and they must be present at the time.

A=Acceptable, Accepting emails, messages or opening pictures and files from unknown people can lead to problems, they might contain viruses or nasty messages!

R=Reliable, Some information online might be untrue or someone online could be lying about who they are.

T=Tell, You should tell a trusted adult or parent/carer if something or someone online is making you feel uncomfortable or if someone you know is being bullied.

STEAM Week - Spring Term

This is a regular event where schools across the country celebrate all things involving: Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics (STEAM). This term the topic was *A Whole New World - Animals*. We made new species of animals that could be discovered by joining two different animals together. So, for example, a lion and giraffe, a cat, rat and bat or even a turtle and a jellyfish.

We had to think about things like its habitat, diet, if it was a predator or prey and its defences. We were put in pairs and together designed, drew and labelled an animal showing all the above elements. Then we made a 3D model of our animal out of tin foil, paper and card or even playdough



On the 15th of March all the animals from the whole school were displayed in the hall for parents to come in and see after school. Classes had designed their own background, either individually or as a class, to show the habitats these animals would live in.







Also, at the Science Fair was an amazing display of all the projects which had been submitted regarding the homework on "Why is this Science?" The children were set the task of recording themselves doing something which was based on science and then explaining how this was the case. Who started black power?





Easter Chocolate Bark



Ingredients

1kg of milk chocolate

Sweets to decorate, such as: Mini eggs, Chocolate buttons, Coloured sprinkles Dried fruit

A little butter to grease the baking tray.

Equipment

1 large heatproof bowl 1 large saucepan 1 spatula Greaseproof paper Baking tray Food bag Rolling pin



Method

- 1. Break the chocolate into small pieces in the heatproof bowl and place over the saucepan of water (ensure the water doesn't touch the bottom of the bowl!)
- 2. Stir the chocolate as it melts using the spatula.
- 3. Grease the baking tray and cover with greaseproof paper.
- 4. Put the mini eggs, chocolate buttons, etc. into the food bag and crush up using the rolling pin.
- 5. Once the chocolate is melted, pour it onto the baking tray.
- 6. Tilt the tray from side to side until the chocolate is spread evenly over it.
- 7. Use your sweets to decorate the chocolate as you Wish.
- 8. Allow the chocolate to harden before carefully peeling off the greaseproof paper. Break the chocolate into different shapes and sizes of shards.
