

Class: Shakespeare

In Shakespeare we have begun to explore a new book in English entitled "Arthur Spiderwick's Field Guide to the Fantastical World around you". Here is an excerpt from James' writing on one of the mythical beasts:


Empowerment



Class: Jeffers Pupil: Elijah This week during Child Initiated Learning Elijah chose to use his phonic skills to write a range of CVC words.

He said the name of each picture and then sounded out each word, he wrote the phonemes he could hear.

Spiritual, Moral, Social, Cultural and British Values



In RE this week, year 6 have been looking at the Bible story of Daniel. The children listened to and watched the story, then retold it in their own words.

We discussed the link between the story of Daniel, and religious persecution.

The children were asked about whether they felt people should be persecuted for their religion, and here are some of their responses.

Emily C said 'It is not right to persecute people, if you are religious you choose to be kind'.

Jenson explained 'I do not think it is okay for

people to be persecuted for not doing what someone else says, because you can't take someone's life away if they don't do what you want. It is just not right'.

The children from year 3 to 6 have completed an online Google form about their wellbeing. They answered 20 questions about their feelings, sleep, diet, how well they are supported and liked, both in school and out. Here are the highlights;

90% said they were happy and their life was going well,

80% agreed or strongly agreed that they had many good qualities,

85% felt liked by others,

83% agreed or strongly agreed that there was a grown up at home that was interested, listened to them and wanted them to do their best,

75% said that they helped out at home and grown ups asked their opinion about family issues, 80% agreed or strongly agreed that there was a grown up at school that was interested,

listened to them and wanted them to do their best,

78% said that they had friends in school that played with them, looked after them and cared how they feel,

84% said that they were trying to do their best in school,

62% said that they kept going if they got stuck or made a mistake,

91% said if they needed help they knew who to ask

32% rated school 10 out of 10 and 74% rated it between 6 and 10 out of 10

Our only real concern was that 15% of children felt that they did not get enough sleep.



BREAKFAST CLUB

- Breakfast Club runs from 7.30am to 8:45 am and includes breakfast.
- Breakfast club costs £3.50 per child per day.
- Children must be signed into the club by whoever is bringing them to school.
- Children should not be dropped at the gate and sent into the club on their own. Breakfast on offer includes such choices as: cereal, toast, croissants, fruit, and fruit juices.

AFTER SCHOOL CLUB

- After School Club runs from 3.15 to 6.00 pm in two sessions:
- 3.15 5:00pm Session A £7.00 per day per child
- 3.15 6.00 pm Session B £8.50 per day per child
- A snack such as sandwiches, wraps, cheese, biscuits, and fruits are served to all children attending the after-school club.
